CITIZENSHIP #5 - DECISION MAKING

CIVIC APPROVAL PROCESS

1. A citizen or a group of citizens present a proposal to a civic body.

proposal - an issue or project that someone wants considered.

civic - about citizens.

civic body - a governing institution.

2. Applicable regulations are reviewed.

applicable - regarding the proposal.

regulation - existing law and policy.

3. Public testimony is sought.

testimony - written or verbal opinion from citizens.

4. The civic body deliberates and takes action.

deliberate - discuss and debate about both proposal and testimony.

take action - vote to approve, disapprove, or delay.

PROCESS FOR TAKING ACTION

- 1. An issue or proposal has been presented, and public testimony taken.
- 2. One of the representatives makes a motion.

motion - a formal suggestion, made at a meeting, for something to be done. Typical language: "I move that ______ be approved." Conditions may be part of the motion.

3. Another representative must second the motion. If there is no second, the motion dies, and a different motion must be made.

second - a formal agreement to support the motion. Typical language: "I second the motion."

- 4. The chairman of the meeting repeats a successful motion, says who made the motion, and says who seconded the motion.
- 5. All representatives discuss the motion. When the chairman determines discussion has been sufficient, a vote on the motion is taken.
- 6. All representatives except the chairman of the meeting vote. The chairman votes to break a tie.

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
